

Tittensor CE (VC) First School Online Safety Policy

The purpose of this policy statement

Tittensor CE (VC) First School works with children and families as part of its everyday practice as a school.

The purpose of this policy statement is to:

- ensure the safety and wellbeing of children and young people is paramount when adults or children are using the internet, social media or mobile devices
- provide staff and volunteers with the overarching principles that guide our approach to online safety
- ensure that, as an school, we operate in line with our values and within the law in terms of how we use online devices.

The policy statement applies to all staff, volunteers, children and young people and anyone at Tittensor CE (VC) First School.

Legal framework

This policy has been drawn up on the basis of legislation, policy and guidance that seeks to protect children in England. Summaries of thekey legislation and guidance are available on:

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We believe that:

- children and young people should never experience abuse of any kind
- children should be able to use the internet for education and personal development, but safeguards need to be in place to ensure they are kept safe at all times.

We recognise that:

- the online world provides everyone with many opportunities; however it can also present risks and challenges
- we have a duty to ensure that all children, young people and adults involved in our school are protected from potential harm online
- we have a responsibility to help keep children and young people safe online, whether or not they are using Tittensor First's network and devices
- all children, regardless of age, disability, gender reassignment, race, religion or belief, sex orsexual orientation, have the right to equal protection from all types of harm or abuse
- working in partnership with children, their parents, carers and other agencies is essential in promoting their welfare and in helping children to be responsible in their approach to online safety.

We will seek to keep children and young people safe by:

- appointing an online safety coordinator [this may or may not be the same person as yournominated child protection lead]
- providing clear and specific directions to staff and volunteers on how to behave onlinethrough our behaviour code for adults
- supporting and encouraging the young people using our service to use the internet, socialmedia and mobile phones in a way that keeps them safe and shows respect for others
- supporting and encouraging parents and carers to do what they can to keep their childrensafe online
- developing an online safety agreement for use with young people and their parents/carers
- developing clear and robust procedures to enable us to respond appropriately to any incidents of inappropriate online behaviour, whether by an adult or a child/young person
- reviewing and updating the security of our information systems regularly
- ensuring that user names, logins, email accounts and passwords are used effectively
- ensuring personal information about the adults and children who are involved in our school is held securely and shared only as appropriate
- ensuring that images of children, young people and families are used only after their writtenpermission has been obtained, and only for the purpose for which consent has been given
- providing supervision, support and training for staff and volunteers about online safety
- examining and risk assessing any social media platforms and new technologies before they are used within the school.

If online abuse occurs, we will respond to it by:

- having clear and robust safeguarding procedures in place for responding to abuse (includingonline abuse)
- providing support and training for all staff and volunteers on dealing with all forms of abuse, including bullying/cyberbullying, emotional abuse, sexting, sexual abuse and sexual exploitation
- making sure our response takes the needs of the person experiencing abuse, any bystandersand our school as a whole into account
- reviewing the plan developed to address online abuse at regular intervals, in order to ensure that any problems have been resolved in the long term.

Mobile phones and Smart Watches

- Children are not permitted to bring a mobile phone to school. We feel that children at Tittensor First School are not of an age where they need a mobile phone in school. Children can speak to the class teacher/ office if they need to communicate with their parents/carers.
- Children are not permitted to wear a SMART watch in school. This poses a Safeguarding risk due to the use of a camera and the ability to personally communicate whilst in school.
